Article I. NAME.

To most clubs this is a relatively simple matter. If you want an original name, choose one that would mean something to people unfamiliar with your organization.

Article II. PURPOSE.

The objectives should be discussed. Make sure they are general and wide in scope. The purpose should show how the club will contribute to Sonora High School by meeting some social, academic or service needs of its members. The club should also have a purpose that aids in the school community or helps the student body in some way.

Article III. ELIGIBILITY.

Membership restrictions shall be allowed only in honorary clubs or in those clubs in which special achievement is required. Otherwise clubs should be open to all students.

Article IV. TIME AND PLACE OF MEETINGS.

All clubs must hold their meetings on regularly scheduled days except when given permission by the club's cabinet to assemble at another time.

Article V. DUES.

The dues shall not be expected, except when a national membership is required.

Article VI. NUMBER. TYPE. DEFINITION OF DUTIES OF OFFICER AND ELECTION PROCEDURES.

You must include a definition of all officers, their duties, how they are elected, and when elections are to be held.

Article VII. AMENDMENTS.

A club should have a 2/3 majority vote of members present to amend its constitution. All amendments must be cleared through the club's cabinet.

Model Club/Organization Constitution

The following is meant to serve as a model for any club or organization seeking recognition under the auspices of the <u>Sonora High School Associated Student Body (ASB)</u>. Clubs or organizations are to submit a constitution that follows this model along with the application and constitution will be reviewed by the Assistant Principal and the <u>ASB Club Committee</u>. The information in *italics* is meant to provide you with additional assistance in completing that portion of the constitution. Note: This form is just a sample.
