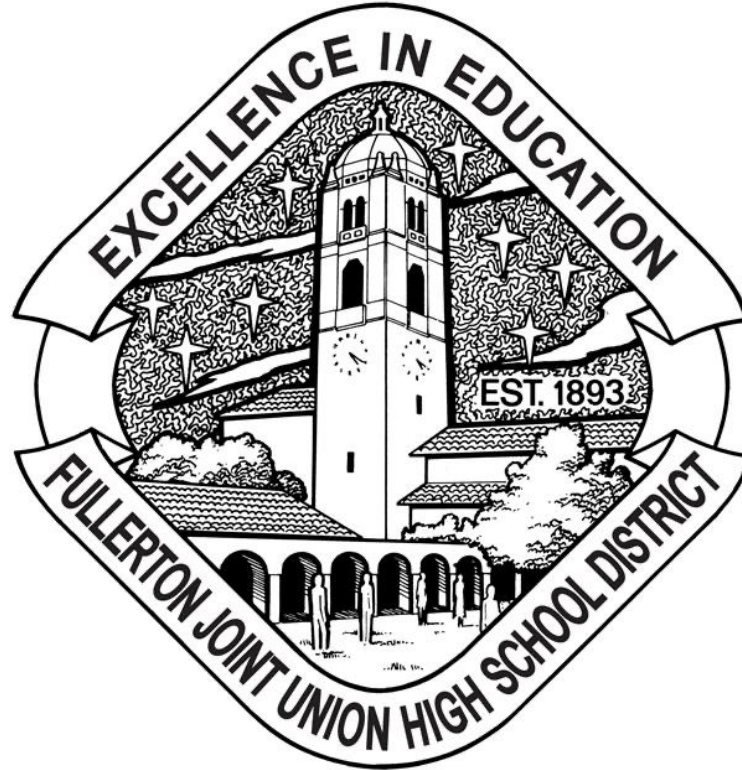

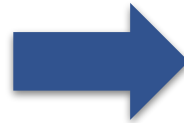

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ELAC Outreach Strategies

OUTREACH	DESCRIPTION
Newsletters Mailings Letters Flyers Brochures Marquees	<p>Parents have a lot of competing demands for their time. This flyer will help remind them why helping out at school is worth their while. The messages you send parents can make the difference in whether they decide to get involved at school. Share these messages in emails, newsletters, and social media posts and on bulletin boards to show parents how much impact they can have.</p> <p>All written material needs to be translated into Spanish and may be translated to other language as needed (California Education Code, Section 48985).</p>
Face to Face	<p>Face to face is a give-and-take process of listening, persuading and asking. Face to face is not everyday conversations, they are intentional conversation designed to build relationships and motivate parents to <u>take action</u>. The point is to try to inspire people to build collective power to make things better in the schools, and using the face to face as a tool to identify people who are ready to <u>take action</u>.</p>
Live Phone Banking	<p>Phone banking is a great way to personalize a call to parents/guardians of ELs. Phone banking callers are able to call in the home language identified, explain and answer questions in reference to ELAC and the ELAC Information Meeting. The list of Parents/guardians of ELs contact information can be found on PowerSchool by home language.</p> <p>Suggestion: Consider having EL seniors assist as volunteers to fulfill their end-of-year requirement of community service.</p>
Presentations to Groups	<p>Listeners have one chance to hear your talk. Leave your audience with a clear picture of your request and make them want to read your paper. Your presentation should not replace your paper, but rather whet the audience's appetite for it. Thus, it is commonly useful to allude to information in the paper that can't be covered adequately in the presentation.</p>



Parent Club Idea

What is the role of a parent club?

- Parent clubs foster closer links between parents, teachers and the principal; facilitate parental participation in their child's school; and work together with school staff to ensure the best possible educational outcomes for the benefit of all students.
- A parent club is not a sub-committee of school council and has no formally prescribed powers or duties. However, club members working together with the school council can provide a vehicle for schools to effectively collaborate with families, and support them to engage with their children's learning.
- They can provide input into school decision-making and organize cultural, social, educational and fundraising activities.



Coyote W.E.B. (ELD Ambassador Program)

Hi,

I am very excited to share about our Coyote W.E.B. program at BP for our newly arrived English learners. This group was formed two school years ago with three girls who were also ELD students and have now graduated and gone on to college!

Coyote W.E.B. (Welcome Every Buddy) is a student-created and student-led newcomer orientation program for students who are newly arrived to the country. During HOWL, students learn about high school, learn how to read grades and transcripts, learn about language learning tools, and tour classrooms to learn about what Buena Park has to offer. photos are of the ambassadors speaking with the new students as well as conducting group discussions. These students have helped me develop the topics to cover based on what is important for an ELD student to know. They have also talked about their own experiences as ELD students and are serving as a system of support for their peers. I'm already noticing the confidence in our new ELD students and the comfort they're feeling knowing there are other students who were once in their shoes and have been successful in high school.

Forming A Parent Club

If there is no existing parent club at the school, and there is sufficient interest from a number of parents in forming a club, one or two interested parents should arrange to meet with the principal to discuss the possibility of formally establishing the new parent club.

The formal process is outlined below.

On receiving a written request signed by at least six parents of students at a school, the principal must:

- convene a meeting for the purpose of forming a parent club
- take reasonable steps to circulate a notice informing the school community of the meeting (at least 14 days before the meeting).

Goal: To empower members to become educated community workers and volunteers, giving back to the community and breaking free from such challenges as poverty, lack of trusted support systems, language barriers, and lack of familiarity with local systems. To form a partnership among parents to become authentic partners with local communities, schools, teachers, and students.
