
Joaquin Rios spent his day applying to five colleges, including the US Naval Academy, Norwich, and UC San Diego.



SECURITY GATES CREATE A NEW NORMAL ON CAMPUS

Students were stunned after seeing the once infamously open campus of La Habra High School now surrounded by metal fences, limiting access and raising several questions in the students' minds concerning their daily livelihood at school.

The new fences, which provide only three regular entrance and exit points for students to the campus, start from the north end of Monta Vista Street and stretch down to the 20s hall, where they continue west between the hallways and finally fill in the courtyard and driveway between the Band Room/Lecture Hall and the PAC.

The three entrance points are located the west side of the school at the student parking lot, at the south side of the school at the entrance of Main Hall, and on the east side of the school on Monta Vista. The designated entrance points open at 7:15 am and are closed during school hours. Campus Security briefly reopen them for HiStep and lunch, but then close them again at 1:34 pm. They are again opened at 2:37 pm and remain open for sports and students and are later closed for the night.

"I'm not a big fan of the gates because they can make leaving and coming back to the school difficult if you're out during lunch," says Senior Liam Fuller.

"I don't have a 6th period and when leaving after 5th, none of the kids including myself could leave the school." Senior Liam Fuller expressed.

The student concerns reflect a common sentiment among the student body: they all hate them.

However, school and district administration sees the addition of the fences as the logical next step in ensuring the security of our school.

"We started working towards making sure that we are more proactive instead of reactive," says LHHS Principal Steve Garcia, "there was a huge amount of support in securing the safety of our students and staff so there was a continuous effort to make it possible and we are lucky as over the course of the summer we were able to get that done."

Additionally, in addressing the student negative feelings towards the fences from the general student body, Principal Garcia points out the obvious: "you've gone through K-8th grade with gates and security."

At the end of the day, the fences and gates are here to stay and their presence is slowly becoming a part of our everyday reality.

"It's a shift," says Mr. Garcia, "but we still have the same opportunities for lunch that we had before, it's just a new part of our history."

but with 19 students coming out to audition, Mr. Migliorini, the theater teacher, would certainly have some tough decisions to make.



SHOHEI OHTANI'S 50/50 IS JUST ANOTHER CHAPTER IN HIS FANTASTIC FIRST YEAR WITH THE DODGERS by Mia Soza

As if he hasn't tormented other teams enough already, Shohei Ohtani has become the first player in MLB history to reach 50 stolen bases and 50 home runs in a single season.

On September 19th vs. the Miami Marlins, Ohtani had video game numbers at the plate to make history. On some ordinary Thursday night late in the season, Ohtani put up shocking numbers— even for him. Upon reaching his 51st home run and 51st stolen base, he went 6 for 6, batting in 10 runs and homering 3 times.



As crazy as it sounds, if you've watched Ohtani enough, it shouldn't be surprising that he's the one to accomplish the remarkable feat.

"When you think he can't rewrite the script or rise to a certain expectation at any moment, he does", credited Dodgers manager Dave Roberts. "If you're looking at skill set, then if there's anyone who can do it, it's Shohei."

Even though the standard set for Ohtani is quite high, it was hard to expect such a prolific accomplishment from the 30-year-old because of his physical condition, due to Tommy John surgery he underwent in September 2023.


It was advised that Ohtani likely shouldn't step foot on the mound until the 2025 season even though he could bat, which would resultantly—at least everyone believed—diminish the two-way star's effectiveness. But with Ohtani's batting achievements in barely his first year with a new team, it's hard to be mad about him being held back from a pitching standpoint.

To make matters worse for Ohtani this offseason was a betrayal like no other: from his longtime friend and interpreter. This March, Ippei Mizuhara was fired by the Dodgers for reportedly stealing millions of dollars from Ohtani to cover his gambling debts. Though some were skeptical that Ohtani himself knew about the situation before it came out for everyone to hear, Mizuhara pleaded guilty in June for stealing a whopping \$17 million from Ohtani.

While such news was shocking to the baseball world initially, the two-way phenom's impressive performances at the plate despite a whirlwind offseason has allowed everyone's focus to return to his exceptional and unparalleled talent, finishing the season with a .310 average, 54 home runs, and 59 stolen bases. But there's still one thing Ohtani has yet to achieve: A world series championship.

Now, the regular season has officially come to an end, and the Dodgers have secured the 12th straight playoff berth and the best record in baseball. With that, comes an opportunity for Ohtani to be at the forefront of the Dodgers rush to their 8th World Series championship, and a chance to add on to his already history-book-worthy first season.

"My goal has always been to make it to the playoffs," Ohtani told reporters for the Los Angeles Times after reaching 50-50— a goal only the best of the best could even dream of accomplishing. "Now, my goal is to deliver in a playoff situation."
