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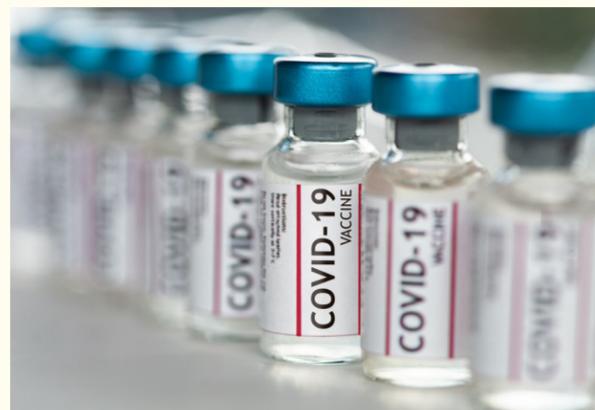

St. Valentine's Day Massacre

When you hear about Valentine's Day, your mind instantly goes to a day with flowers and heart shaped everything. However there isn't much talk about the Saint Valentine of Terni, especially the Saint Valentine's Day Massacre. Saint Valentine's real name is to be considered, Saint Valentine of Terni. He was born in Italy, in 175 AD, then died from being beheaded on February 14, somewhere in the year of 270 AD. This was because the emperor, Claudius the Cruel, at the time had discovered that Saint Valentine had been marrying people in order to keep the men from going to war and dying because of it. When Saint Valentine had done so, it was what had made him a saint, and later on a marauder. What made him a marauder was that he put his life on the line or sacrificed his life for his beliefs. Which he did, when marrying couples he had gone against Claudius's orders.

On February 14th, 1929, a north side Chicago gunfight broke out. seven men had died, however the aftermath of this gunfight resulted in 64 dead total that year. In 1924-1930 the city of Chicago had become the largest city for gang violence in the country. The two gangs that had been feuding since 1925 were led by George "Bugs" Moran and Al Capone, respectively. This dire crime had not been committed by accident, but rather an elaborate scheme committed by Capone's gang.

On the morning of Valentine's Day, 1929, two of Capone's men had disguised themselves as police officers, at the

warehouse at 2122 N. Clark Street, which was frequently used to store liquor by George "Bugs" Moran. Capone's men had lined up several of Moran's men, including Frank "Hock" Gusenberg, who had been Moran's enforcer at the time. Gusenberg was the only one still alive when law enforcement arrived at the warehouse, but refused to reveal anything before he died from his injuries several hours later.

After being lined up two other of Capone's men had come in dressed as civilians, the four men had pulled out machine guns and released 70 rounds of ammunition, on the seven against the wall. The reason this massacre had been committed was because of the tension and rivalry between the two gangs. After four years of Moran's gang hijacking Capone's shipments, killing his allies and providing competition for business, it caused Capone to reach his boiling point. Before the massacre Moran was the only thing in the way of Capone's crime syndicate to dominate over all gang activity in the entire city of Chicago.

Federal authorities, including the Federal Bureau of Investigation, had much less jurisdiction than they have today, and did not include Chicago's gang-related activity. Although this massacre isn't related to Saint Valentine's Day to a good extent, it remains the most sizable unsolved crime in history that occurred on the holiday.

Klay Thompson is Back! (The Most Anticipated Return of the 2021-22 NBA Season)

(continued from the front page) With just over two minutes left in the third quarter, already having 28 points under his belt, Thompson writhed in pain, landing uncomfortably after a break-away dunk attempt.

Thompson, reluctantly, was carried off the court but his durability as a player was put on display as he returned

to check himself in and shoot the two free throws he was fouled on. After hitting both free throws, heading to the locker room, and time feeling like an entirety, it was

revealed Thompson's left leg injury was the worst imagined— a torn ACL.

The night was a bust for Golden State's dynasty, losing a key player to a season-ending injury in a series-ending loss. Steve Kerr, Golden State's head coach, stated "You got to be kidding me...I don't know if it's related to five straight seasons of playing a 100-plus games and just all the wear and tear, but it's devastating."

With at least a six month recovery in the books to help regain Thompson's strength and mobility back, the Golden State franchise looked at playing the entirety of the 2019-20 season without one of their top two scorers on the court.

All the franchise, friends and family, and fans could do in the coming months was witness the future first ballot hall of

famer do what is needed for his full recovery expected for the start of 2021-22 season. It brought everyone contentment as Thompson shared moments of his dog Rocco accompanying him throughout rehab.

But the anticipation for his return was shot when calamity struck once more. Well on his way to full recovery, in a pickup game Thompson had suffered a torn Achilles tendon in his right leg during a workout in November 2020. From an ACL injury with rehab of just six months to a torn Achilles with

rehab of eight to ten months – Thompson looked to be missing out on the entirety of the 2020-21 NBA season.

When an MRI confirmed the new season-ending injury, Stephan A. Smith, respected sports personality & analyst, expressed "I'm really sad that he's down because he makes the NBA better... He deserves all the praise in the world

because he makes the game better."

The recovery that required surgery first didn't have a set recovery time as torn Achilles varies on a case-by-case basis. The only

obvious was that much more of Thompson's time would be spent on the bench, only being able to watch and cheer on his teammates. That wasn't enough for Thompson, though, and his Splash Bro Stephen Curry commented, "He's playing pickup, he's around our practices and he's back with us in those types of situations, but he's still not on the court... And it shows how much this game matters to him."

As Thompson approached the ending of his two-year rehab he would show up and complete full workouts at the Chase Center. Thompson would enjoy private warmups in full uniform just proving Curry's point.

As he's fully recovered from tears to his left ACL and his right Achilles tendon, Thompson's two-season absence from the court has come to an end. Sunday, January 9th of this year at 5:30 pm, Thompson was introduced to the fans to play his first game ever at Chase Center. After sustaining two of the most unimaginably excruciating injuries for an NBA player, Thompson wanted to make sure the people did not forget the kind of player he was—how good he is.

He played, hungrier than ever to remind everyone who he is. And so he did exactly that and he showed out in the Warrior's win over the Cleveland Cavaliers 96-82. Thompson received Player of the Game with 17 points (scored the first point for the GSW, points included 3 threes and 3 rebounds) in just 20 minutes.

At the after-game press conference, Klay Thompson expressed, "I'm so grateful to compete again. It's been a long road...It was a special moment I'll never forget."

And the praise continued from all around starting at the fans, to his peers, and from additional important faces in the NBA. So there's no need to wonder exactly the kind of player Thompson would be upon his most anticipated return. So there's no need to wonder exactly the kind of player Thompson would be upon his most anticipated return because he'll continue to fuel the fire with the doubts of others.

And that is exactly what the man has done. In the seven games following his awaited return, Thompson's 2021-22 season stats show an average of 14.7 points with 2.8 rebounds and 2 assists per 13.02 minutes played.

So, whether you're his number one fan or not, we'll all be waiting to see how his return to the basketball court unfolds throughout the rest of the 2021-2022 season.

There is nothing more you could ask for from the 77th best NBA player to ever play (if you know, a snub!) the game of basketball after two career-altering injuries. There's still plenty of season left to see where both Thompson and the franchise will be led in regards to returning to their continued legendary dynasty.

Nearing the end of the second half the Highlanders looked to get the ball forward as the Coyotes pressure was causing the Highlanders to fall back and defend. A ball was then found into the middle of the pitch from a Coyote turnover.

The ball moved up the field and eventually was passed to Senior Jasper Bateman who dribbled to the right corner flag and then inside to have a shot on the Coyote's keeper. The shot was deflected off the keeper's hands and was found once again by Bateman who was able to slide a pass across the goal to teammate Tyler Porter.

Porter made quick work of this opportunity finding the back of the net and sending the Highlanders into a comfortable 2-0 lead over the Coyotes with only about 7 minutes left in the match.

As the game neared the final minute the crowd roared and happily accepted a hard fought win over the Buena Park Coyotes.

illustrated high school.

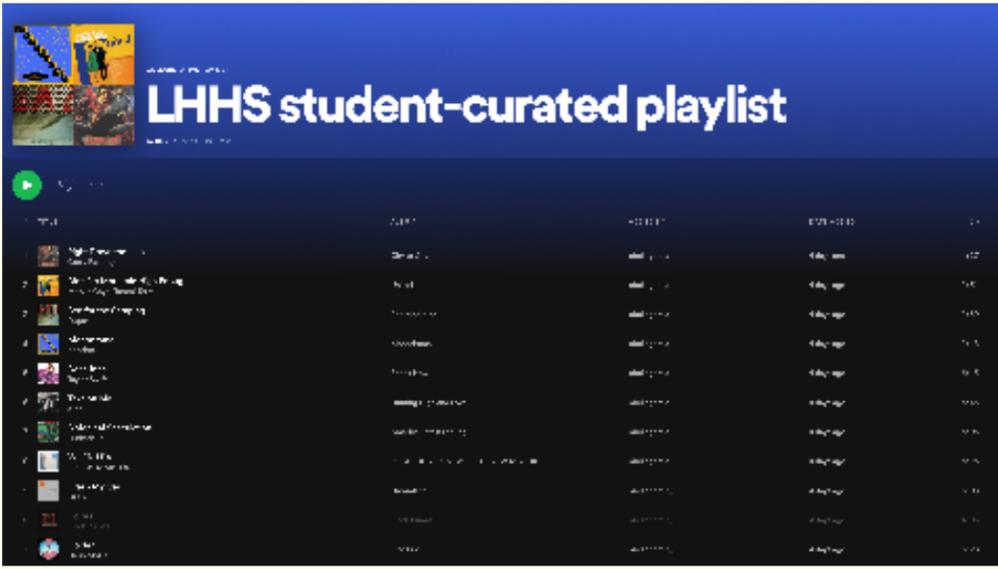
