



January 8, 2021 Sunrise at Troy, 1-8-21

Warriors,

In December, we completed our fall semester of what was likely one of the most challenging periods in our lives. This week all of us returned to school and the beginning of the spring semester having taken time away from school. Hopefully we were able to achieve some much needed rest, relaxation, possibly able to shift our attention from the trials and tribulations we have been facing on a daily basis since March. We are hopeful for a New Year in 2021 that will bring the end to the pandemic and a return to a sense of "normalcy".

As I had written in the last *Warrior Weekly* of 2020, there is "light at the end of the tunnel," as the vaccines are here. More vaccines are being produced and are coming, but now the distribution hurdles need to be overcome, which I do believe will occur very soon. However, there are more challenges ahead before we get back to "normal" in our school and our lives. First, we are in a midst of a COVID-19 surge that is taxing our health care system. Our hospitals are filled with COVID-19 patients. Right now is probably the worst time in our lives to need emergency medical care due to the gigantic demand and burden on our hospitals and medical staff. Second, the California Stay at Home Order has been extended, in an effort to try and limit the number of people who are exposed to the virus, and our Board of Trustees moved FJUSHD schools temporarily out of hybrid, in an abundance of caution to help us deal with the COVID-19 surge. Hopefully these steps will have the desired effect, while all of us are waiting to get the vaccine. These are difficult times. We will get through them, but we must work together and must not be divided in our efforts. This takes me to my last point. We are hopeful 2021 will be

a much improved year. On Wednesday I watched, and I believe all Americans watched in disbelief and horror as a mob attacked Capital Police Officers, storming the U.S. Capital building and our U.S. Congress which was in session at that time. There are really no words that can fully convey my deep sadness, shock, and anger, seeing American citizens fighting with the police, and in the process injuring dozens and killing one officer who gave his life to protect our elected representatives who were doing the business for which we elected them to office. Our U.S. Congressional buildings have not been invaded and since 1814 when the British did so, and set them on fire. But at that time were at war then with a foreign country. What happened on January 6, 2021 was an attack on our country by a mob. Those involved in this attack and responsible will be held accountable. We believe in democracy and the Constitution upon which our democracy is based. We believe in rule of law, and if we don't like the laws there are mechanisms to change the laws. Mob rule is not one of those mechanisms. The Regeneron Science Talent Search provides students a national stage to present original research and celebrates the hard work and novel discoveries of young scientists who are bringing a fresh perspective to significant global challenges. The 300 scholars and their schools will be awarded \$2,000 each. The Regeneron Science Talent Search scholars were selected from 1,760 applications received from 611 high schools across 49 states. Scholars were chosen based on their exceptional research skills, commitment to academics, innovative thinking and promise as scientists and hail from 193 American and international high schools in 37 states, Puerto Rico and two additional countries.

Troy Tech Coordinator, Ms. Laurie Downum-Bonnett also wrote, "Nitin's research was completed in connection to his Troy Tech virtual summer 2020 internship at City of Hope...I was very impressed that three doctors from City of Hope made time for Troy Tech Interns to join their research in the midst of the pandemic." I suspect the quality of Nitin's research was also very strong reason the medical doctors at the City of Hope wanted to keep mentoring somebody they hope will be a future colleague! Outstanding work, Nitin!




