


November 22, 2019

The scene was amazing during Monday's practice round for the Troy Girls Golf Team as they prepared to defend their State Championship. Monterey, California, 73 degrees, sunny, gentle breeze blowing. The participants: seniors Isabel Sy, Sherilyn Villanueva, and Amy Kim, junior Kamille Dimayuga, and sophomores Gabby Kano and Hannah Ulibarri. The girls gathered information about the iconic Poppy Hills Golf Course as they played, measuring distances and making plans on what club to hit on each hole.

But when they got to the course Tuesday it all changed. 15-25 MPH wind, intermittent sunshine, 60 degree temperatures (in other words - normal weather for mid-November). It became a day of survival, with all players in

the field struggling to make pars. As has been their pattern this post-season, the Warriors got behind early and by the half-way point things were starting to get out of control and the Palo Alto Team was getting out of touch. With only a few holes to go it was apparent that taking first was not going to happen, but the girls kept fighting. 2. Our final Troy Tech tour is the morning of **Tuesday, December 3**. We will visit the same classrooms as the previous tour dates.

3. We have a campus-wide event **Wednesday, December 4 from 3:30-4:30 pm.** Classrooms open, all departments represented, school clubs, information sessions in library, food sales, athletic practices, photo opportunities, Troy Tech giveaways, and more. 4. Friday morning **December 6** Ladera Vista 8th graders will visit Troy (North Gym) from 9-10:00 a.m.

In the Pacifica High School Drill Meet last Saturday, our NJROTC competed and were ready for the uniform inspection they knew would be taken very seriously. As always our team looked great and passed this portion of the competition with flying colors.

In Cyber Patriot cyber security news, the Troy teams and the middle school teams that train with Troy are performing well through the second round of Cyber Patriot competition held last Saturday and Sunday at Troy. Round three is on December 7th and 8th. Here is the cyber update from Cyber Defense Teacher and Coach extraordinaire, Mr. Allen Stubblefield: *Cyber Competition Summary: #1 Nationally in both High School Divisions #4 in Middle School. Round 2 finished up last night with some fantastic results despite some rather frustrating computer issues. My apologies for those teams who we had to relocate on Sunday morning to another room, sometimes more than once. In the end, everyone got to compete. #1 in Open: Our returning national champion team smoked Round 2 with a perfect score on their 3 images in only 1 hour and 6 minutes for the 6 hour round. Our other 45 Open teams* included 9 others in the top 100 out 2,500+ teams. ALL of our teams have shown they have learned a lot!

#1 in NJROTC: In what is sure to be a Troy dog fight in January for the semi-finals, Troy finished this weekend #1-4, 6, 8 & 9 amongst NJROTC teams, with all 15 teams in the top 50% of the 223 total.

#4 & #10 in Middle School: Beechwood's team of 8th graders shows what happens when a team works together for 3 years. Starting as 6th graders in 2017, they rocked Round 2 from 800+ teams. Cedar Lane of Hacienda Heights Team 1 was close behind in 10th place with a group of 2nd year competitors. Diamond Bar's new team finished 43rd. We had 18 middle school teams competing at Troy this weekend, with all but Cedar Lane practicing at Troy. Official results due next week. Round 3 is Dec 7 & 8. Go Cyber!

Troy has built a reputation, especially since the inception of Troy Tech in 1986 of being an academically rigorous school, capable of providing many opportunities for the students that choose to come here. Along with our Troy Tech Magnet program, in 1986 we also brought in the International Baccalaureate program to give students an academically rigorous program with an International Diploma. Fast forward to 2019...Troy High School is internationally known as a school for outstanding academics in the classroom, but also in academic competitions such as our thirteen National Championships in Science Olympiad. Our students are attending college after graduation at a 99% rate, and they are prepared when they get to college as they persist and graduate, something that colleges and universities really love.

Due to the consistent success of our school, many schools not only in our district but in surrounding districts have made decisions to strengthen their academic programs not only for their current students, but to also keep from losing their future students to Troy. Not being a school to sit back and be reactive, we choose the proactive approach to better serve our students that are here as well as those that choose to come here in the future. To this end, after researching a new program beginning last November, the Troy Department Leaders decided to move forth with bringing the <u>Cambridge Advanced International Certificate of Education</u> (AICE) Diploma to Troy High School. Our decision was supported by our superintendent Dr. Scambray and Cabinet and we proceeded to move forward for approval of this program at Troy.

On October 17th, Mr. Keith Lucey the Senior Manager East North America and Dr. Nancy S. Potter, School Development Manager West North America for Cambridge Assessment International Education conducted a school visit to determine Troy's eligibility for the program. After their visit, both of them, FJUHSD Superintendent, Dr. Scambray, FJUHSD Assistant Superintendent, Dr. Kaufman, and I, went to meet with Orange County Superintendent, Dr. Al Mijares to speak about bringing the Cambridge AICE Diploma program to Troy High School and allowing us to build the program. Both the Troy site Cambridge visit and the meeting with Dr. Mijares were a success, and I am happy to report beginning in the 2020-21 school year our students will be able take coursework towards earning the Cambridge AICE Diploma!

Do keep this in mind, no programs are leaving and we have added another option with Cambridge! If I had it to do it over again, I would not go to Arcadia High School, but I would come here. Between AP, IB, AVID, Cyber, Troy Tech and the Internships, Athletics, Drama, Music, Art, Computer Science, and NJROTC I would be here for sure!

With the addition of Cambridge, not only will our students be able to earn the Cambridge AICE International Diploma, but we are able to weave the content into many of the higher level AP and IB courses we currently offer. It takes outstanding teachers to be able to do this, and we have them. They are organizing the coursework in this manner so students do not test until the second year when they will take what is known as the "A Level" examination. We have especially chosen the "A Level" examinations as the route Troy students will use to achieve the AICE Diploma as colleges and universities treat these courses as "higher level" when determining college credit and there is added benefit. Cambridge "A Level" examinations actually predate Advanced Placement (AP) by four years beginning in 1951 and are as well known by colleges and universities worldwide as AP and IB.

Another benefit, for our students is they can begin the AICE coursework as early as 9th grade, rather than having to wait until 11th grade, which will help them spread out the rigor of the International Diploma curriculum. Additionally, this premise goes hand in hand with some of our efforts in teaming up with the Stanford University *Challenge Success* program this year.




