Warriors.

After today, there are two weeks left in the 2020-21 school year! Seniors, final exams begin for you on Thursday, May 20<sup>th</sup> through Monday, May 24<sup>th</sup>. Seniors, make sure all work that needs to be turned in to your teachers is done with time to spare! For all students in every grade, it is of the utmost importance to finish for all students to finish the year strong!

All of us have gone through this pandemic together, and it has been a challenging year. Orange County is anticipated to move into the COVID-19 Yellow Tier either May 18<sup>th</sup> or 19<sup>th</sup>, joining Los Angeles County and many other counties throughout the State of California. Yesterday the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and President Biden announced changes to federal mask policies for those that have been vaccinated. Do keep in mind that individual States and counties have the final say on masking and other COVID-19 related rules until the pandemic is officially declared to be over.

Regarding continued wearing of masks in FJUHSD, Mr. Manuel Macias our District COVID Administrator sent out the following guidance this morning. "Although the CDC has updated its guidance and recommendations for masks (indoors and outdoors) for fully vaccinated people, CDPH and OCHCA have yet to update their guidance regarding masks for fully vaccinated individuals in schools. Students and staff must continue to wear a face-

covering at all times, while at school. All safety protocols currently in our Health and Safety Plans must be followed (indoor and outdoor).

District Lead Nurse Ynette Johnson is seeking further guidance from OCHCA and we will provide an update once we have it."

For our athletes a real immediate change for them in the FJUSHD as a result of the anticipated move to the Yellow Tier by Orange County, will be they no longer have to test for COVID-19 to keep playing sports! This change is effective on Monday, May 17<sup>th</sup>

As I have previously reported, Governor Newsom has made it clear the State of California will reopen fully on June 15<sup>th</sup> and the color coded COVID-19 tier system ends. With the changes from the CDC on masking, it remains to be seen what the mask rules will be at that time, but stay tuned. Governor Newsom has also been very clear and increasingly vocal, making comments on Monday in regards to all students returning to school in person for the fall 2021-22 school year. "The state's in-person learning exemption would lapse after June 30 and "everybody should be back in the fall and in person." This is true in the Fullerton Joint Union High School District at all our comprehensive high schools. We will not have hybrid classes in the fall as even though I know this method of instruction cannot be implemented better than our Troy and FJUHSD teachers have done it this year, hybrid simply does not compare favorably to in-person learning.

At Troy, we all look forward to the end of this year, and the return to the high level college prep and college level instruction, socialization, school events, sports, activities, Back to School Nights, Open House, Troy Tech, IB, Cambridge, AVID, NJROTC, Theatre, Choir, and Instrumental Music performances, rallies, Prom, and the Elf Dance! All of us have persevered, and have beaten this pandemic and will be stronger and more resilient for having gone through this together! We are proud to be Troy Warriors and part of the FJUHSD family!



AP Exams continue into the end of Week 2! Today and Monday are the last examinations in the 1<sup>st</sup> exam administration! The 2<sup>nd</sup> AP exam administration is Digital at Home and begins for our students on Tuesday, May 18<sup>th</sup>! AP students, make sure you are well rested, relaxed, and have eaten a good meal prior to being ON TIME for the exam. For Monday's in person exams:

#### For MORNING Exams:

- Report to campus at 7:00 AM to the entrance near the North Gym.
- You will complete the daily check-in process (i.e., Since cell phones are not allowed in the exam,
  Qualtrics will not be used for checking in. Rather, students will complete a paper screening form with
  any recent symptoms, receive a temperature check and obtain a wristband before proceeding to the
  exam.)
- · Please proceed directly to your testing room and line up for check-in.

### **For AFTERNOON Exams:**

- Report to campus at 11:00 AM to the entrance near the North Gym.
- You will complete the daily check in process (i.e., Since cell phones are not allowed in the exam,
   Qualtrics will not be used for checking in. Rather, students will complete a paper screening form with
   any recent symptoms, receive a temperature check and obtain a wristband before proceeding to the
   exam.)
- · Please proceed directly to your testing room and line up for check-in.

# YOU ARE TO READ ALL EMAIL COMMUNICATION FROM TOTAL REGISTRATION REGARDING YOUR EXAMS AND EXAM LOCATIONS.



Bring ONLY the following items in a clear plastic bag:

- A photo ID (i.e., student ID card, passport, or California issued ID or driver's license card)
- Sharpened number two pencils.
- A few pens with blue or black ink.
- An approved calculator, if needed for the exam. A list of approved calculators may be found here: https://apstudents.collegeboard.org/exam-policies-guidelines/calculator-policies
- · Optional: A clear, plastic disposable water bottle with the label removed (no reusable water bottles allowed).



The following items are prohibited. If a student is observed with any of these items during testing or breaks they may be dismissed from the exam, the device may be confiscated, the student's score may be canceled, and no retest will be permitted:

- No purses, bags or backpacks of any kind.
- No electronic equipment including phones, smartwatches, fitness trackers, wearable technology, cameras, recording or listening devices, or any other type of electronic or communication device. The only exceptions to the above restrictions are Chromebooks or other devices specifically required to be used for in-school digital testing.
- No books, reference guides, notes, compasses, protractors, mechanical pencils, pencils that are not No. 2, correction fluid, dictionaries, highlighters, or colored pencils.
- No scratch paper. Scratch paper will be provided, if allowed.
- · No watches that beep, make a noise, or have an alarm.
- No calculators that are not approved.
- No reference guides, keyboard maps, or other typing instructions.
- · No ear plugs.
- · No clothing or shoes with subject-related information.
- No food or drink. Note: You may access free meals at the cafeteria before school, at break, or at lunch.
- No clipboards.

For students taking the Digital at Home AP Exams, in the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> AP testing administrations, please make sure you are following the College Board procedures for digital testing. This means students taking a digital exam must follow these procedures. From our AP Coordinator, Ms. Lisa Avila: "The digital, at-home AP exams will begin next week and it is imperative that students have followed the appropriate steps necessary to take the exam. If students are using school-issued Chromebooks, the app is already installed, but they still need to login and follow the additional instructions 1- 3 days before their exam and then logon 30 minutes before the start time on exam day. Students who are using their own at-home computer will need to download and install the digital app before logging in.

## PSA: How to try to stop Ransomware at school and home

All of us saw the ransomware attack on a gasoline pipeline company critical to U.S. infrastructure. While many of us were surprised, those in the cyber defense world were not surprised at all, and truthfully have been warning against these kind of attacks becoming more common. Our own Cyber Defense educator and coach Mr. Alan Stubblefield sent out an email earlier this week which is so valuable it bears repeating. So here it is...

Troy,

The <u>hack of Colonial Pipeline</u> has been in the news since last Friday. You may be wondering if you could be the target of a ransomware attack. The answer is **YES!** 

Cybercriminals are in for the money. They have little or no scruples or morals. If hit at home, expect to pay several hundred dollars in cryptocurrency to get your files back. Imagine not having Aeries the week of finals for grades = help keep our school network safe, too!

Obvious things that you can do NOW:

- **Strengthen your passwords** (12+ characters long, combination of letters/numbers/symbols
- Turn on 2 factor authentication for your email accounts, financial accounts and any other account that needs a login. Here is how to turn on 2 factor authentication for your school and Google accounts: https://www.google.com/landing/2step/
- **Beware of emails** from people who you don't know. Yes, as teachers, we get emails from parents and student personal email accounts. Use your best judgement.
- Backup your important files. School files to your Google Drive. Home files (photos, videos, finances to a USB drive or external hard drive, then PUT THE DRIVE IN A DRAWER!
- Consider using a password manager. I use Lastpass, but there are many others. The free versions are usually good enough.


