Principal's Commencement Address

Congratulations to the Troy High School Class of 2018! Four years ago, in 2014 all of you began Troy High School as wide-eyed freshmen, many of you wondering what you had gotten yourself into. Or perhaps wondering what your parents, or siblings had gotten you into. In 2014, like you I started Troy High School and I was the wide-eyed new principal. As much as I had learned about Troy, you never really know until you actually get here, meet people, begin school, and start to understand this place. I too was wondering what I had gotten into. What I soon discovered is Troy High School is a place, a school like no other. In my career, I have worked in five school districts and six schools.

When I say Troy is special, I do so with the knowledge and personal experience of working in schools that are similar to Troy, trying to be like Troy, and nothing like Troy. Troy is something hard to comprehend, especially to people on the outside--even within our own school district. You have come here from every school in Fullerton Joint Union High School District, and virtually every school district in the region. Students are here from four counties, and 100 different middle schools. The three seniors that just gave commencement addresses, described in their own words their experiences at Troy, experiences in the last four years that have helped shape who they are today. To the graduates tonight, many of their experiences likely sound familiar, there is truth in their words and I cannot do a better job describing the life of a student at Troy these past four years than those that have lived it.

Captain of our Cheer squad, Best Buddies vice-president, Girl Scout Gold Award recipient, she embodies unwavering dedication and diligence as she willed herself to overcome fear, unease, personal and academic challenges. Samantha will be attending Texas Christian University in the fall. Application of knowledge...

Our students work hard and they are outstanding! ASB, Best Buddies, NJROTC, Choir, computer science, FBLA, Cyber Defense, Troy Tech Internship, AP, IB, AVID, and we are the Science Olympiad California state champion since 1996 and twelve time National Science Olympiad Champions four of the past five years, including this year!
